

Admissions, Enrollment, and Graduation Trends in Graduate Nursing Education Programs

2019

This update presents data for 32 of the 33 universities/colleges that offer one or more graduate nursing education programs.¹ There were 35 programs that prepared graduates for licensure as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) and 75 other programs. Table 1 breaks down these programs by education model:

The Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) collected data in the 2019 Board of Nursing's (BON) Nursing Education Program Information Survey (NEPIS) that was available online as of October 1, 2019. The reporting period was academic year (AY) 2019 (September 1, 2018 – August 31, 2019) unless otherwise noted. TCNWS collaborated with the BON in the design and dissemination of the survey.

¹One university with nurse anesthetist programs did not respond to the 2019 Graduate NEPIS; decreases in nurse anesthetist program counts likely reflect the absence of this program's data.

Qualified Applications for APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 2 displays data trends for qualified applications and admissions for APRN programs. Qualified applications were those that met all criteria for admission at the school to which they were submitted.² These numbers represent the total number of applications across all models of education. Numbers by model of education can be found in the subsequent pages of this report.

- The number of qualified applications has increased each year since 2016.
- In 2019, 2,018 (27.5%) of 7,348 qualified applications were not offered admission (QANA), which is roughly the same percentage as 2018.

Table 3 (page 2) lists data on qualified applications and admissions for non-APRN programs. These numbers represent the total number of applications across all models of education. Numbers by model of education can be found in the subsequent pages of this report.

- From 2018 to 2019, there was a 13.2% increase in the number of qualified applications and an 11.1% increase in applications offered admission.
- In 2019, 174 (7.5%) of 2,318 qualified applications were not offered admission (QANA), which is an increase from the proportion in 2018 (5.9%).

Table 4 lists data on qualified applications and admissions from APRN and non-APRN programs that responded to the survey by program type.

- Nurse anesthetist programs had the highest percentage of all program types for the last four years of qualified applications not offered admission, with 68.6% not admitted in 2019 (61.0% not admitted in 2018).

- Nursing research programs had the highest percentage of qualified applications not offered admission among non-APRN programs (24.0%).
- Non-APRN programs offered admission to a larger proportion of qualified applications than APRN programs overall.

Table 5 (page 2) lists data from APRN and non-APRN programs that offered admission to all qualified applications.

Overall, the proportion of programs that offered admission to all qualified applications increased from 48.1% in 2018 to 53.6% in 2019.

- In 2019, 12 out of 35 APRN programs offered admission to all qualified applications (34.3%), decreasing from 43.2% in 2018.
- For non-APRN programs, 47 out of 75 programs (62.7%) offered admission to all qualified applications, an increase from 2018 (50.7%).

The programs that did not accept all qualified applications (19 programs) were asked to rank reasons why qualified applications were not accepted from most important (rank 1) to least important (rank 6).

- The most often rated as “most important” for graduate programs was “lack of budgeted faculty positions” (6 programs), followed by “lack of clinical placement/sites” (5 programs).

Programs that ranked “lack of clinical placement” as rank 1 or 2 were asked to specify the problems regarding lack of clinical placement.

- Some problems programs specified included competition with other programs for placing students (5 programs) and the expense of compensating preceptors (3 programs).

Newly Admitted Students in APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 6 shows the number of newly admitted students in both APRN and non-APRN programs by program type and academic year. Newly admitted students are those who were offered admission and decided to register and enroll in the program.

- Overall, there was a 4.4% increase in newly admitted students from 2018 to 2019.
- There was a 1.5% increase in the number of newly admitted APRN students from 2018 to 2019.
- Nurse practitioner programs reported the highest number of newly admitted students. The number of newly admitted nurse practitioner students increased by 3.8% in 2019.
- Overall, there was a 12.6% increase in the number of newly admitted non-APRN students reported from 2018 to 2019.
- The number of newly admitted nurse-midwife students more than doubled from 2018 to 2019, representing the largest percent increase of any program type.

Total Enrollment in APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 7 and Figure 1 show the total number of students enrolled on September 30 of the respective year by program type over time.

- Overall, student enrollment in both APRN and non-APRN programs has continued to increase year over year.
- The number of students enrolled in nurse-midwife programs more than doubled since 2018.

Figure 1. Total Enrollment in APRN and Non-APRN Programs Type, 2014-2019

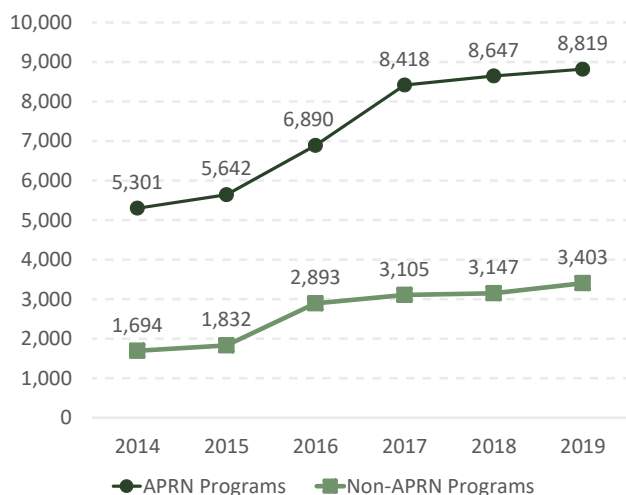

- The majority of students were enrolled in master's degree programs for every program type except nurse anesthetist and nursing research programs.
- The majority of doctoral APRN students were enrolled in post-baccalaureate DNP programs.

Graduates from APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 9 shows the APRN and non-APRN graduates by program type over the past 5 academic years. Table 10 shows graduate totals for APRN and non-APRN programs by education model.

- The number of graduates has continued to increase each year in both APRN and non-APRN programs.
- The majority of graduates from APRN programs were in nurse practitioner programs (94.9%).
- Nearly half of graduates from non-APRN programs were in a nursing leadership/administration program (49.7%).
- The majority of graduates in both APRN and non-APRN programs received a master's degree (82.2%).

APRN Graduates Planning to Work in Texas

24 of the 27 schools with APRN programs reported the number of APRN graduates who plan to work in Texas.

- These 24 schools reported 1611 APRN graduates, 1461 (90.7%) of whom plan to work in Texas.

Schools were also asked to rank reasons why APRN graduates planned to work in states other than Texas from most important (rank 1) to least important (rank 4).

- The most frequently selected reason as most important was “other state is state of residence/ Family in other state” (12 programs), followed by

“full practice authority” (8 programs).

- “Higher pay in other states” was selected as second most important by 12 programs.
- Other reasons schools listed included job opportunities (3 programs) and personal preference (1 program).

Program Profile: Nurse Anesthetist Programs¹

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nurse anesthetist (NA) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 11). The 4 programs offered 2 different models of education: post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- The majority of newly admitted students, enrollees, and graduates were in a post-baccalaureate DNP education model.
- More than two-thirds of qualified NA applications were not offered admission.
- The one graduate school that did not respond to the 2019 Graduate NEPIS has NA programs; any decreases in counts from 2018 likely reflect this omission (Figure 2).

Table 12 displays total enrollment numbers for NA programs by model of education.

- In 2019, there were roughly the same number of enrollees in DNP programs compared to 2018.
- No responding school had a master's degree or post-master's certificate program for NAs in 2019.

Figure 2. Nurse Anesthetist Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2013-2019

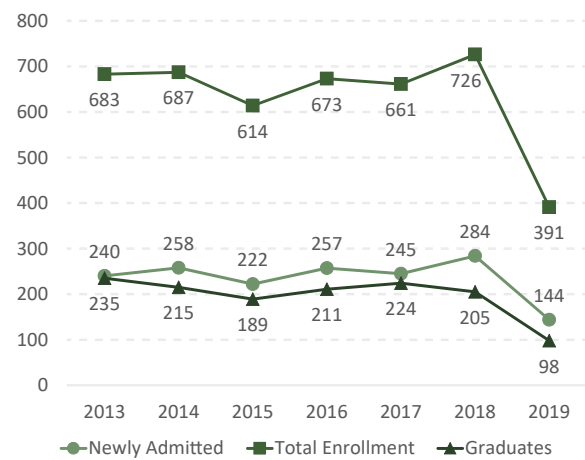

Program Profile: Nurse Practitioner Programs

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nurse practitioner (NP) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by model of education (Table 14). The 26 programs offered 4 different models of education: master's degree, post-master's certificate, and post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- About a quarter of qualified applications were not offered admission regardless of education model.
- The majority of newly admitted students, enrollees, and graduates were in master's degree programs.
- Overall, admissions, enrollments, and graduations increased since 2013 (Figure 3, Tables 15 & 16).

Table 17 shows the number of NP graduates by population focus areas.

- Over two-thirds (68.4%) of graduates had a family population focus area.

Figure 3. Nurse Practitioner Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2013-2019

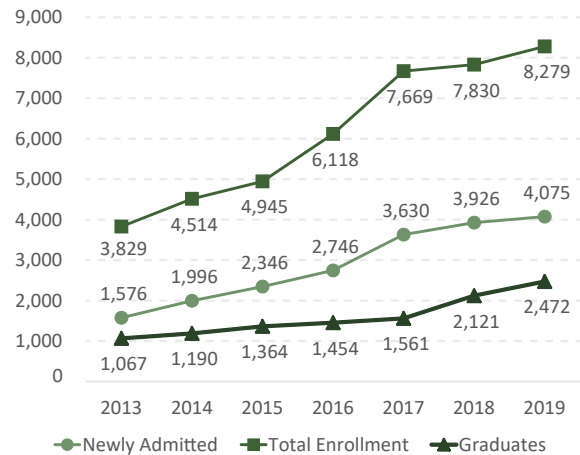

Program Profile: Clinical Nurse Specialist Programs

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, clinical nurse specialist (CNS) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 18). The 3 programs offered 3 models of education: master's degree, post-master's certificate, and post-baccalaureate DNP.

- The majority of CNS students were enrolled in master's degree programs.
- There was little change in admissions, enrollment, and graduates from 2018 (Figure 4, Tables 19 & 20).

CNS programs were also asked to identify the number of graduates from each population focus area.

- All graduates were in the adult/gerontology population focus area.

Figure 4. Clinical Nurse Specialist Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2013-2019

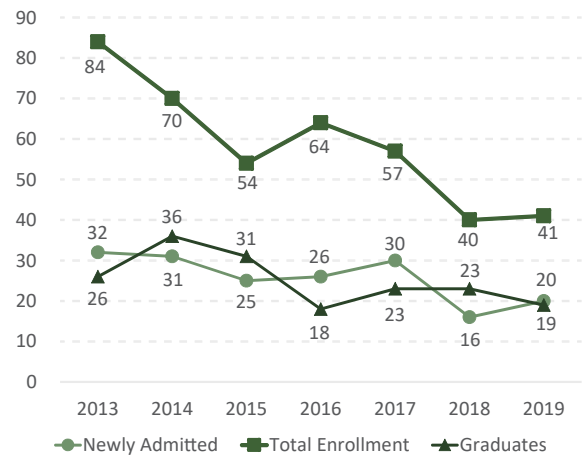

Program Profile: Nurse-Midwife Programs

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nurse-midwife (NM) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 21). The 2 programs offered 4 different education models: master's degree, post-master's certificate, post-baccalaureate DNP, and post-master's DNP.

- Though the majority of newly admitted students (56.3%) were admitted to post-baccalaureate DNP programs, the majority of enrollees (55.6%) and graduates (56.3%) were in master's degree programs.
- The number of newly admitted NM students increased by 255% from 2018.
- The number of NM enrollees and graduates increased by more than 100% from 2018 (Tables 22 & 23).

Figure 5. Nurse-Midwife Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2013-2019

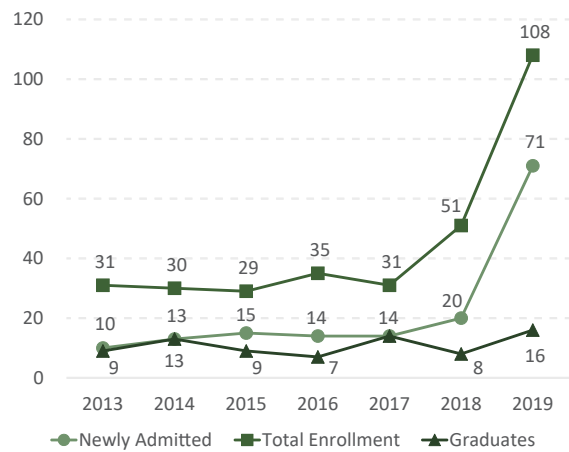

Program Profile: Nurse Leadership/Administration

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nurse leadership/administration programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 24). The 22 programs offered 4 education models: master's degree, post-master's certificate, post-baccalaureate DNP, and post-master's DNP.

- The majority of nurse leadership/administration students and graduates were in a master's degree program.
- Though total enrollment decreased from 2018, the number of newly admitted students and graduates has continued to increase (Figure 6).
- The decrease in enrollees and increase in graduates between 2018 and 2019 occurred regardless of education model (Tables 25 & 26).

Figure 6. Nurse Leadership/Administration Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

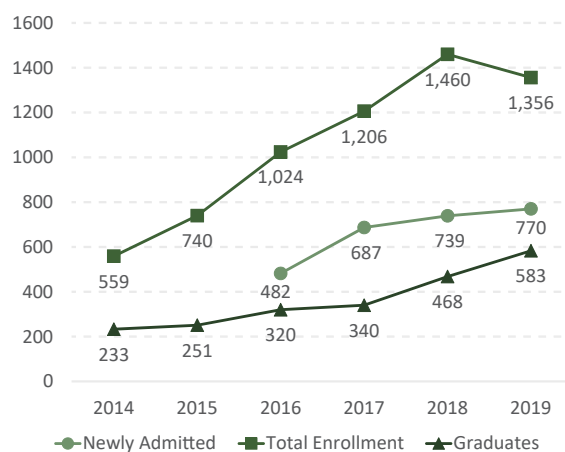

Program Profile: Nursing Education

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nursing education programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 27). The 21 programs offered 2 education models, master's degree and post-master's certificate.

- The majority of newly admitted students, enrollees, and graduates were in the master's degree education model.
- Though the total enrollment increased from 2018, the number of newly admitted students and graduates decreased (Figure 7, Tables 28 & 29).
- Nearly all qualified applications were offered admission (97.4%).

Figure 7. Nursing Education Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

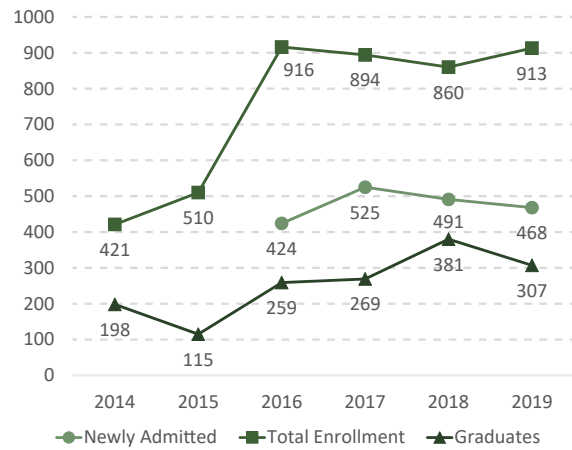

Program Profile: Nursing Informatics

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nursing informatics programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 30). The 2 programs offered 3 education models: master's degree, post-master's certificate, and post-master's DNP.

- The number of graduates has continued to increase since 2015 (Figure 8).
- Both newly admitted students and enrollees have declined each year since 2016 (Figure 8, Table 31).
- The majority of nursing informatics students were enrolled in a master's degree program (74.4%).
- Though the number of graduates from master's degree and post-master's certificate programs decreased from 2018, the number of graduates from DNP programs increased (Table 32).

Figure 8. Nursing Informatics Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

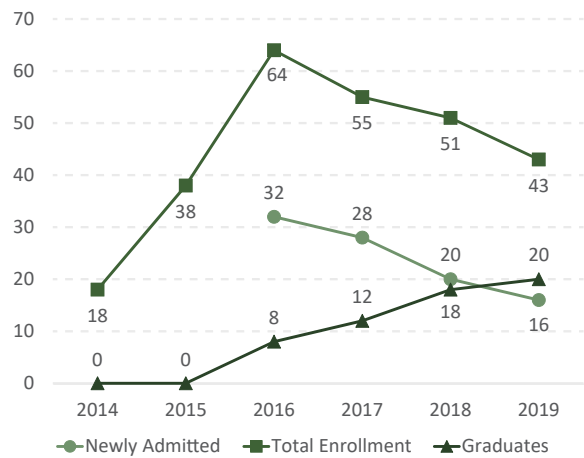

Program Profile: Clinical Nurse Leader

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, clinical nurse leader programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 33). The 6 programs offered 3 education models: master's degree, post-master's certificate, and post-master's DNP.

- The number of newly admitted students, enrollees, and graduates have all been declining since 2017 (Figure 9).
- All of the newly enrolled clinical nurse leader students were admitted to the master's degree and post-master's certificate education models.
- Though one post-master's DNP program was reported, it had no new admissions, enrollees, or graduates.
- In 2019, there were 31 students enrolled in the clinical nurse leader programs, dropping 38% from 2018 (Table 34).
- Similarly, graduates declined from 2018 by 20.6% (Table 35).

Figure 9. Clinical Nurse Leader Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

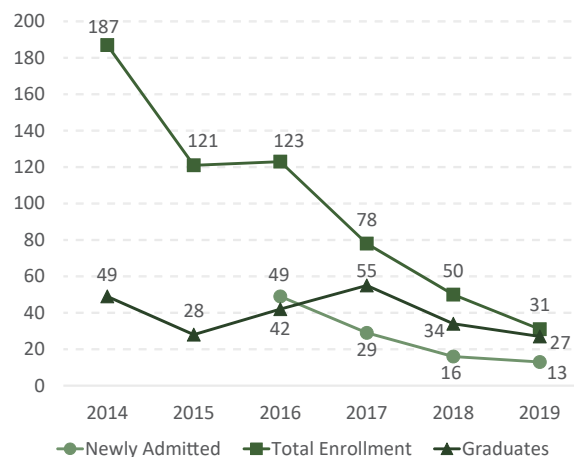

Program Profile: Nursing Research

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, nursing research programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 36). Nursing research is a program track that prepares nurses, in clinical or academic settings, to garner quantitative and qualitative research findings to be applied to the betterment of healthcare. The 7 programs offered 1 education model, a PhD in nursing.

- All of the newly enrolled nursing research students were admitted to the PhD education model.
- 76.0% of the qualified applications were offered admission, which is similar to 2018, when 76.3% of applications were offered admission.
- The number of newly admitted students increased by 46.2% from 2018 (Figure 10), while the number of enrollees decreased slightly.

Figure 10. Nursing Research Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

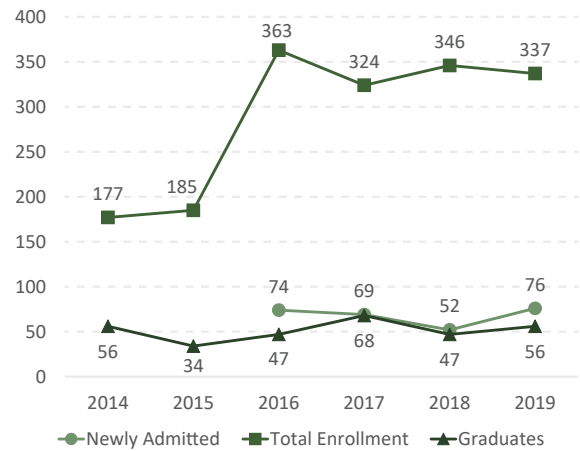

Program Profile: DNP - No Specialty/Generic

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, DNP programs with no specialty were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 37). The 9 programs offered 1 education model, a post-master's DNP.

- In 2019, there were 235 newly enrolled students in the no specialty/generic programs, increasing by nearly double from 121 students in 2018.
- Admission was offered to 88.7% of qualified applications, decreasing from 97.3% in 2018.

Tables 38 and 39 compare the number of no specialty/generic enrollees and graduates, respectively, between 2018 and 2019.

- The number of enrollees increased 86.2% to 484 in 2019.
- The number of graduates increased by 38.6% from 2018.

Program Profile: All Other

In the 2019 Graduate NEPIS, schools were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by model of education for programs classified as “all other” (Table 40). The 7 programs offered 2 education models: master’s degree and post-master’s certificate. The programs included: comprehensive, forensic nursing science, leadership in diverse settings, advanced pain management, RN post-baccalaureate master’s, and a combined leadership and education program.

- In 2019, there were 119 newly admitted students, increasing 72.5% from 2018 (Figure 11).
- All post-master’s certificate applications were offered admission.
- The majority of students, enrollees, and graduates were in a master’s degree program.
- Graduates and enrollees increased from 2018 as well.

Figure 11. “All Other” Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2019

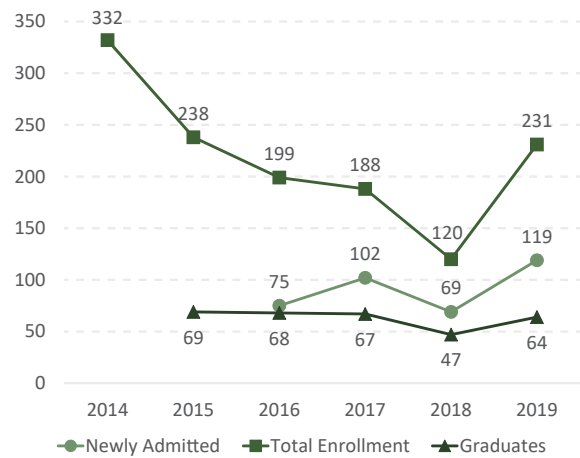

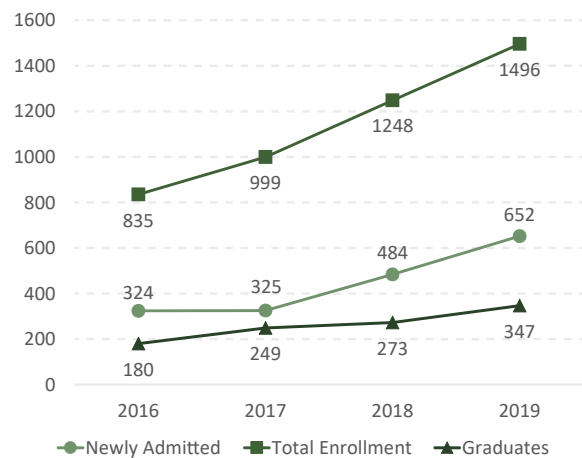

Profile: Doctorate of Nursing Practice

A doctorate of nursing practice (DNP) was offered by 17 of the responding 32 schools offering nursing graduate level education in 2019. These schools offered 2 different education models: post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- DNP admissions, enrollment, and graduates have increased each year since 2016 (Figure 12).
- Though 65.1% of graduates were in the post-master's DNP model (Table 41), the proportion of enrollees was roughly split between the post-baccalaureate and post-master's DNP models (48.8% and 51.2%, respectively).
- Post-baccalaureate models did not offer admission to more than half of qualified applications (53.6%) compared to just 16.1% of qualified applications to post-master's DNP models.
- Nurse anesthetist DNP programs were unable to offer admission to 68.6% of qualified applications, the highest of any program type (Table 42).
