



GRADUATE ADMISSION, ENROLLMENT, AND GRADUATION TRENDS

This update presents data for the 35 universities/colleges that offer one or more graduate nursing education programs. There were 38 programs that prepared graduates for licensure as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) and 76 other programs. Table 1 breaks down these programs by education model:

The Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) collected data in the 2023 Board of Nursing's (BON) Nursing Education Program Information Survey (NEPIS) that was available online as of October 2, 2023. The reporting period was academic year (AY) 2023 (September 1, 2022 – August 31, 2023) unless otherwise noted. TCNWS collaborated with the BON in the design and dissemination of the survey.

Qualified Applications for APRN and non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 2 displays data trends for qualified applications and admissions for APRN programs. Qualified applications were those that met all criteria for admission at the school to which they were submitted.¹ These numbers represent the total number of applications across all models of education. Numbers by model of education can be found in the subsequent pages of this report.

- The number of qualified applications in 2023 decreased by 566 applications, or 9.3%, since 2022.
- In 2023, 913 (16.6%) of 5,509 qualified applications were not offered admission (QANA), less than in 2022 (21.5%).

Table 3 (page 2) lists data on qualified applications and admissions for non-APRN programs. These numbers represent the total number of applications across all models of education. Numbers by model of education can be found in the subsequent pages of this report.

- As seen in Table 3, from 2022 to 2023, there was a 3.0% decrease in the number of qualified applications and a 4.1% decrease in applications offered admission.
- In 2023, 131 (7.3%) of 1,799 qualified applications were not offered admission (QANA), which is an increase from the proportion in 2022 (6.2%).

Table 4 lists data on qualified applications and admissions by program type reported by APRN and non-APRN programs.

- Clinical nurse specialist programs had the highest percentage of qualified applications not offered admission across all program types (50.0%).

- The "other" programs had the highest percentage of qualified applications not offered admission among non-APRN programs, offering admissions to only 124 of 186 qualified applications (33.3%).
- Non-APRN programs offered admission to a larger proportion of qualified applications than APRN programs overall.

Table 5 (page 2) lists the proportion of APRN and non-APRN programs that offered admission to all qualified applications.

- Overall, the proportion of programs that offered admission to all qualified applications decreased from 58.8% in 2022 to 52.6% in 2023.
- In 2023, 16 out of 38 APRN programs offered admission to all qualified applications (42.1%), decreasing from 48.7% in 2022.
- For non-APRN programs, 44 out of 76 programs (56.6%) offered admission to all qualified applications, decreasing from 64.0% in 2022.

The schools that did not accept all qualified applications were asked to rank reasons why qualified applications were not accepted from most important (rank 1) to least important (rank 6).

- The most heavily ranked reason a program did not accept all qualified applicants was a lack of clinical placement/sites, followed closely by a lack of preceptors.

Programs that ranked "lack of clinical placement" as rank 1 or 2 were asked to specify the problems they encountered.

- Programs specified competition with other programs for placing students (2 programs), the expense of compensating preceptors and sites (3 programs), and lack of available preceptors and clinical sites (5 programs).

Newly Admitted Students in APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 6 shows the number of newly admitted students in both APRN and non-APRN programs by program type and academic year. Newly admitted students are those who were offered admission and decided to register and enroll in the program.

- Overall, there was a 1.5% decrease in newly admitted students from 2022 to 2023.
- There was a 2.1% decrease in the number of newly admitted APRN students and no change in the number of newly admitted non-APRN students from 2022 to 2023.
- The number of newly admitted nurse practitioner students decreased by 4.2% in 2023.
- The number of newly admitted students to nurse anesthetist programs increased 38.5% from 2022 to 2023, the only APRN program type to increase admissions over the past year.
- DNP-No Specialty programs increased admissions by 46.0% from 2022 to 2023, the largest increase of any program type.

Seats Unfilled

Tables 7 and 8 show the number of seats for new students and number of newly admitted students to APRN and non-APRN programs from 2016 to 2023, respectively.

- The proportion of seats unfilled in APRN programs ranged from 14.5% to 34.8% in the past 8 years.
- The proportion of seats unfilled in non-APRN programs ranged from 38.3% to 67.6% in the past 8 years.

- It is important to note that, even if all qualified applicants were admitted to non-APRN graduate programs, 26.0% of seats would still be unfilled.

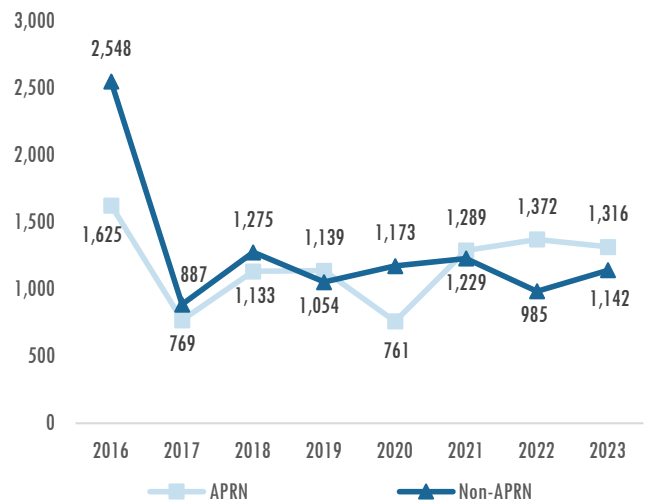

Figure 1 shows the number of unfilled seats for new students from 2016 to 2023 for APRN and non-APRN program types.

- Over the past 8 years, the highest number of unfilled seats for new students occurred in 2016.

- Since 2021, APRN programs have had a higher number of unfilled seats for new students than non-APRN programs.

Table 9 shows the number of seats for new students and the number of newly admitted students by program type in 2023.

- Clinical nurse specialist program type had the highest proportion of seats unfilled (65.4%).

Total Enrollment in APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 10 and Figure 2 show the total number of students enrolled on September 30 of the respective year by program type over time.

- Student enrollment in APRN programs decreased from 2022 to 2023. Enrollment in non-APRN programs also decreased.
- The number of students enrolled in 2023 decreased in 75% (6 out of 8) of non-APRN programs.

Figure 2. Total Enrollment in APRN and Non-APRN Programs Type, 2014-2023

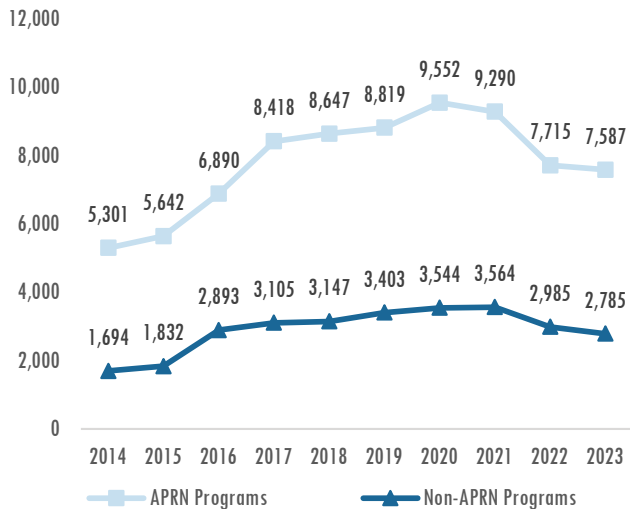

Graduates from APRN and Non-APRN Graduate Programs

Table 12 shows the APRN and non-APRN graduates by program type over the past 5 academic years. Table 13 shows graduate totals for APRN and non-APRN programs by education model.

- The number of graduates showed an overall decrease in APRN and non-APRN programs from 2022 to 2023.
- The majority of graduates from 2023 APRN programs were in nurse practitioner programs.
- The largest number of graduates from non-APRN programs in 2023 were in nursing leadership/administration programs.
- The majority of graduates in both 2023 APRN and non-APRN programs received a master's degree.

APRN Graduates Planning to Work in Texas

APRN programs reported the number of APRN graduates who plan to work in Texas.

- There were 2,132 reported APRN graduates, 1,239 (58.1%) of whom plan to work in Texas.

Schools were also asked to rank reasons why APRN graduates planned to work in states other than Texas from most important (rank 1) to least important (rank 4).

- The most frequently selected as "most important" or "important" reasons were "other state is state of residence/Family in other state" (18 programs) and "full practice authority" (18 programs).
- Other reasons schools listed included military service obligations (3 programs).

Program Profile: Nurse Anesthetist Programs

In the 2023 Graduate NEPIS, nurse anesthetist (NA) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 14). The 5 programs offered 2 different models of education: post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- The majority of newly admitted students and enrollees were in a post-baccalaureate DNP education model.
- 44.8% of qualified post-baccalaureate DNP NA applications were not offered admission.
- One institution with an NA program did not respond to the 2019 Graduate NEPIS; the increase in counts from 2019 to 2020 reflect this omission (Figure 3).

Figure 3. Nurse Anesthetist Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

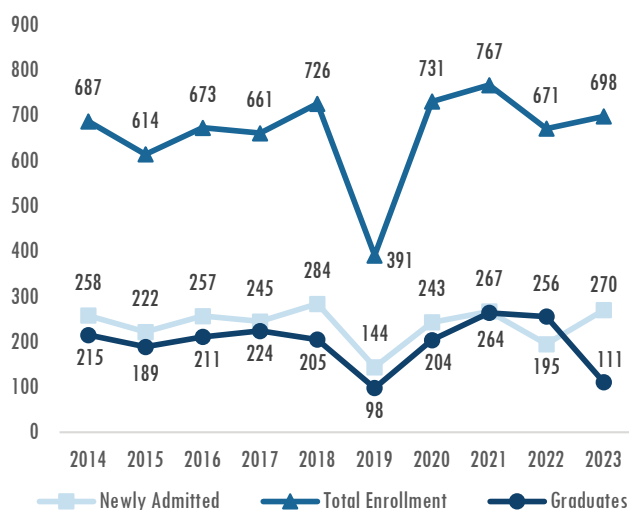

Program Profile: Nurse Practitioner Programs

In the 2023 Graduate NEPIS, nurse practitioner (NP) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by model of education (Table 15). The 29 programs offered 4 different models of education: master's degree, post-graduate certificate, post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- Overall, 13.7% of qualified applications were not offered admission to any education model.
- The majority of newly admitted students, enrollees, and graduates were in master's degree programs.
- Overall, admissions, enrollment, and graduations decreased from 2022 (Figure 4, Tables 16 & 17).

Table 18 shows the number of NP graduates by population focus areas.

- Over half (57.9%) of graduates had a family population focus area.

Figure 4. Nurse Practitioner Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

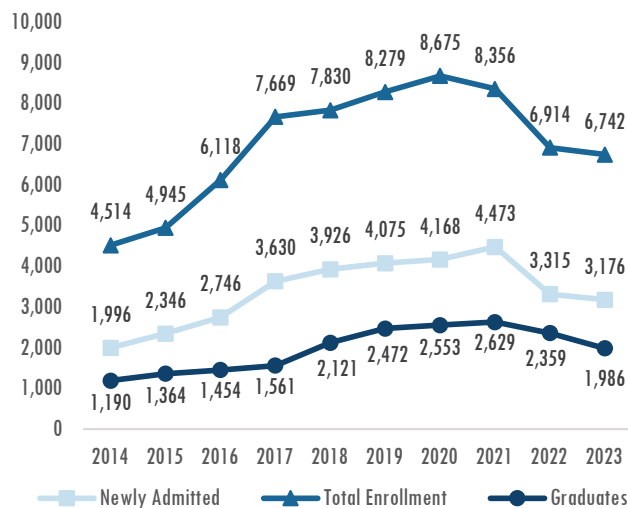

Program Profile: Clinical Nurse Specialist Programs

In the 2023 Graduate NEPIS, clinical nurse specialist (CNS) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 19). The 2 programs offered 2 models of education: master’s degree and post-baccalaureate DNP.

- The majority of CNS students were enrolled in master’s degree programs.
- There was an increase in enrollment and a decrease in newly admissions and graduates from 2022 (Figure 5, Tables 20 & 21).

CNS programs were also asked to identify the number of graduates from each population focus area.

- The majority (9 or 81.8%) of graduates were in the adult/gerontology population focus area. The remaining 2 graduates were in the pediatric population focus area.

Figure 5. Clinical Nurse Specialist Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

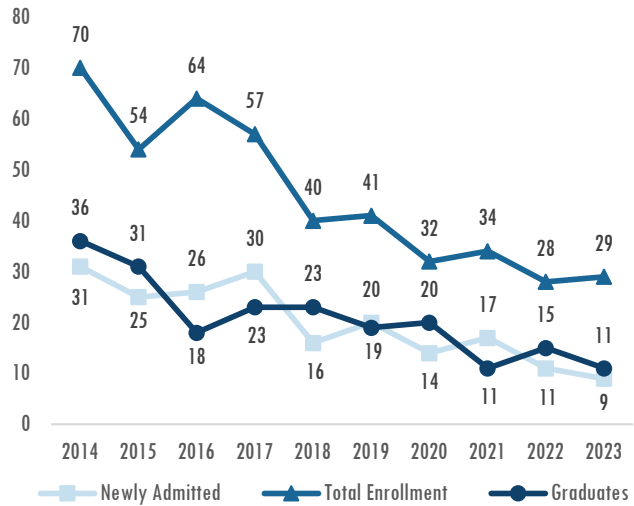

Program Profile: Nurse-Midwife Programs

In the 2023 Graduate NEPIS, nurse-midwife (NM) programs were asked to break out admissions, enrollment, and graduation data by education model (Table 22). The 2 programs offered 3 different education models: master's degree, post-graduate certificate, and post-baccalaureate DNP.

- The majority of newly admitted students, and graduates were in master's degree programs.
- Overall, the number of graduate NM students decreased by 51.0% from 2022 (Table 24).

Figure 6. Nurse-Midwife Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

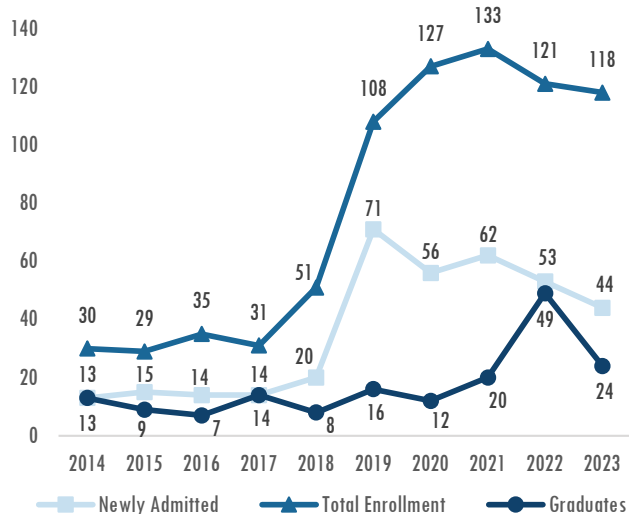

Figure 7. Nurse Leadership/Administration Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

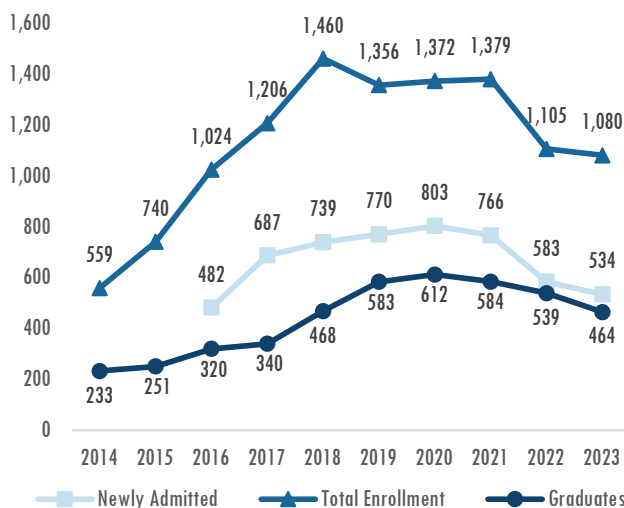

Figure 8. Nursing Education Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

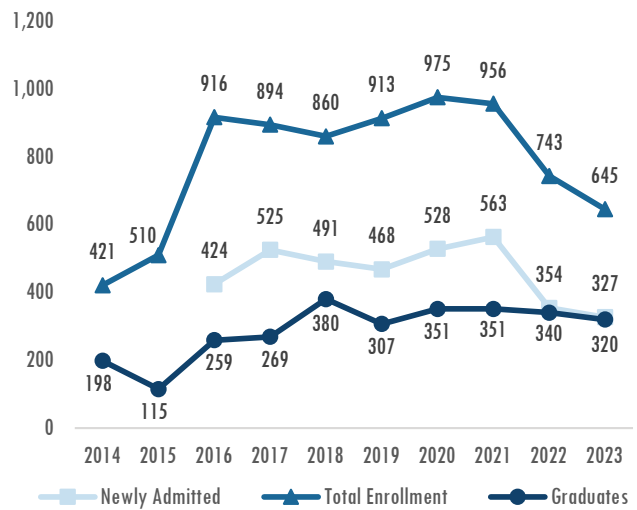

Figure 9. Nursing Informatics Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

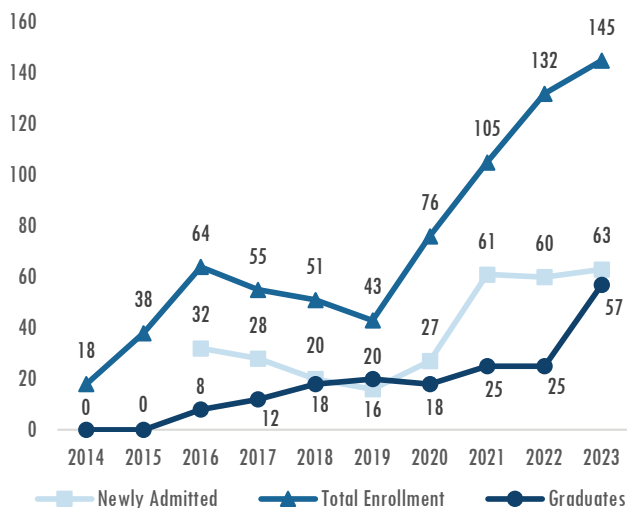

Figure 10. Clinical Nurse Leader Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

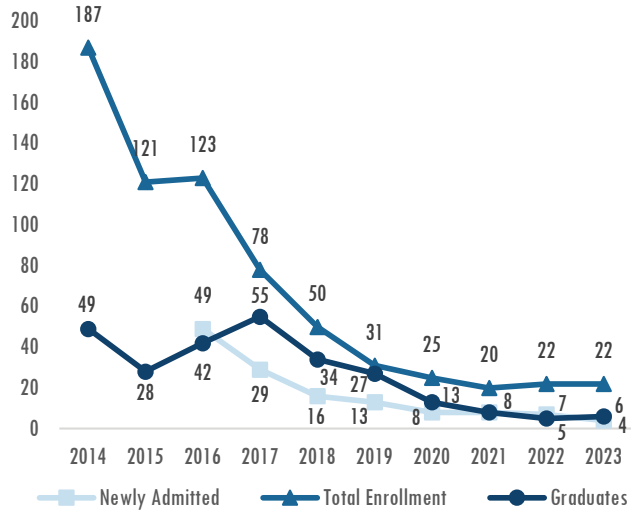

Nursing research is a program track that prepares nurses, in clinical or academic settings, to garner quantitative and qualitative research findings to be applied to the betterment of healthcare. The 7 programs offered 1 education model, a PhD in nursing.

- 76.0% of the qualified applications were offered admission, which is similar to 2022, when 73.8% of applications were offered admission.
- The number of graduates increased by 3 graduates from 2022 (Figure 11).
- Enrollment in Nursing Research programs decreased by 13.9% since 2022 (Figure 11).

Figure 11. Nursing Research Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

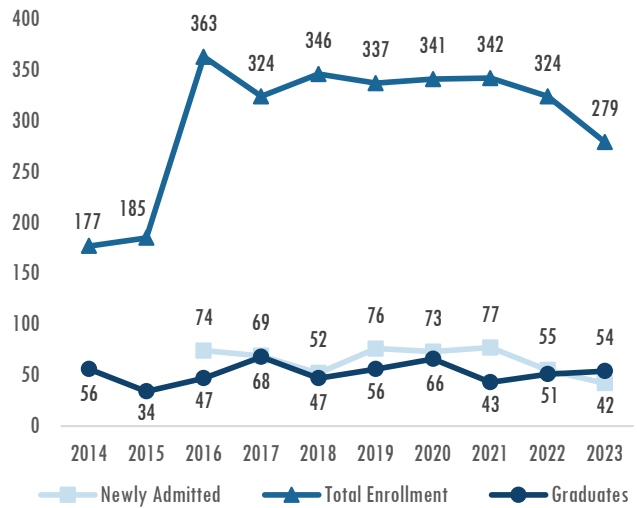

Figure 12. Public Health Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2016-2023

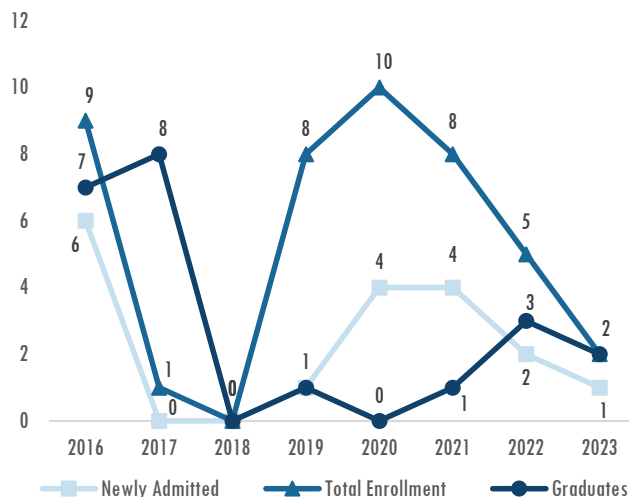

Figure 13. DNP- No Specialty Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2017-2023

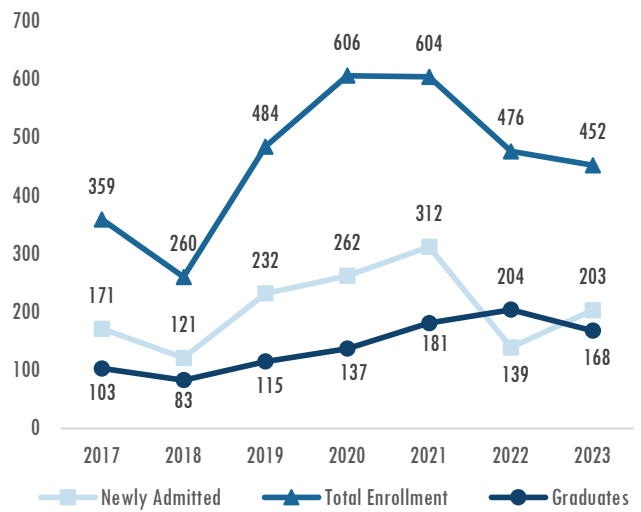

Figure 14. “All Other” Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2014-2023

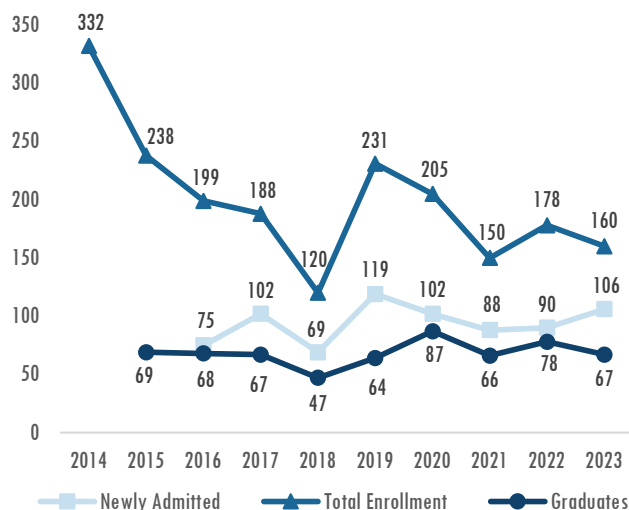

Program Profile: All Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) Programs

A doctor of nursing practice (DNP), including all specialties and program types, was offered by 21 of the responding 35 schools offering nursing graduate level education in 2023. These schools offered 2 different education models: post-baccalaureate DNP and post-master's DNP.

- The total number of DNP enrollees has increased by 2.4% from 2022 (Figure 15).
- The total number of newly admitted students decreased by 2.5% from 2022 (Figure 15).
- The majority of newly admitted students and enrollees were in post-baccalaureate DNP models.
- Post-master's DNP models offered admission to 93.4% of qualified applications compared to 73.1% of qualified applications to post-baccalaureate DNP models.
- Nurse practitioner programs had the largest enrollment in DNP models out of any other program type (Table 38).

Figure 15. DNP Total Enrollment, Graduates, & Newly Admitted, 2016-2023

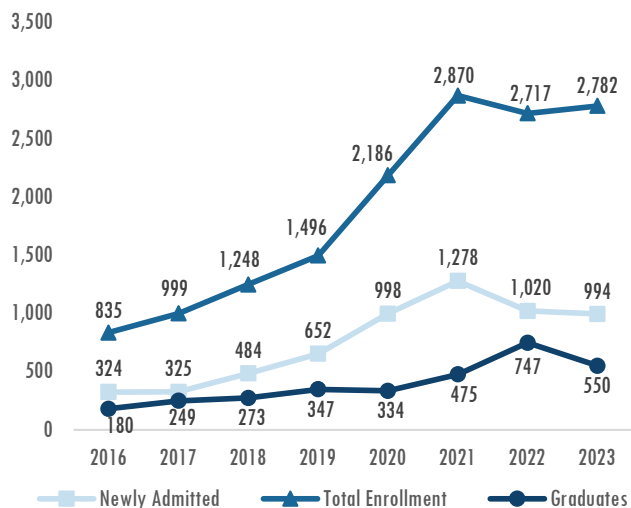
