Finding Your Medical Director

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A Medical Director needs to be more than the name on a form. As one of the most important roles for an EMS provider, the right Medical Director can mean the difference between success and failure or compliance and non-compliance. Regardless of the size of the provider, there are still **MANDATORY** requirements for the Medical Director; and the Medical Director along with the Administrator of Record are responsible for insuring these requirements are met and are held accountable when they are not.

Start with a well thought out job description that lists your expectations. Research the rules and regulations which describe the responsibilities of a Medical Director and make sure those are included in the job description. List performance measures, time-lines, accountability, consequences and/or incentives. Add what you consider to be the minimum amount of staff contact and what it should consist of, what are the responsibilities concerning CE education for staff, for PCR reviews, etc. Outline what you expect from your Medical Director in relation to staff counseling for clinical issues or in dealing with complaints from other physicians or facilities. Write it all into the job description.

When you interview the candidates provide the job description for them to review. Do not be afraid to ask questions! Do they have the time it takes to be an effective Medical Director? Be prepared for their questions! If a Medical Director candidate is willing to attach their license to an EMS provider, they should have questions about operations, certifications, and competency of staff to list a few.

You made your selection. Now what? Have your new Medical Director sign a contract or Memorandum of Agreement that includes the job description as a part of the contract. It should also address the issue of liability insurance, availability of the Medical Director and back-up when he or she is not available. Have a defined orientation. The new Medical Director will need to meet your staff, review your patient care records format, and review what training resources you have in place. Discuss the performance measures outlined for the Medical Director and how they will be accomplished and measured. Set up regular review dates to discuss progress, have a performance measure checklist to review with your Medical Director. Is he/she meeting those measures? Is there need for improvement? Is there need for revision? It is important to keep that open line of communication to make sure everyone's needs are met.

Once you put all that time and effort into selecting and preparing for your Medical Director, make it work! Follow the guidelines and timelines you have set in place. Your Administrator of Record will

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also have the responsibility of following up with the Medical Director. Expect your Medical Director to document his/her review of run records, set credentialing standards for employees who work under their medical license, stay in touch with your staff and be familiar with your operations. Many of the issues that arise or create non-compliance can be attributed to miscommunication or simply a lack of communication.

An active and invested Medical Director will be a positive influence on your organization. So invest the time, ask the right questions, and select a good fit for your organization.

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
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MEASURING TRAUMA SYSTEM EFFECTIVENESS: Trauma Case Fatality Rate



A STANDARD INDICATOR OF TRAUMA SYSTEM EFFECTIVENESS IS THE CASE FATALITY RATE. The trauma case fatality rate is the overall proportion of deaths within a particular population of trauma incidences. The Texas trauma case fatality rate for 2014 was 2.54, almost half a point lower than the 2013 rate of 2.96%.
