

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## New Program Guidelines for ASN and Healthy Texas Women Program

The Healthy Texas Women Program, operated by the Texas Health and Human Service Commission, is not a Medical Access Program and is considered an insurance with limited services. Individuals who are enrolled in the Texas Healthy Women Program are not eligible to receive vaccines under the ASN Program.

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## Administering Flu Vaccines During the COVID-19 Pandemic

CDC has released [interim guidance](#) intended to help immunization providers safely administer vaccines during the COVID-19 pandemic. Routine vaccination during the COVID-19 pandemic is essential for protecting people and communities from vaccine-preventable diseases and outbreaks, including flu. This guidance will be reassessed and updated based on the evolving epidemiology of COVID-19 in the U.S.

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## Who Should Get Their Flu Vaccine During the COVID-19 Pandemic?

Annual flu vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older, with [rare exceptions](#), to decrease flu illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths. Health care providers should use every opportunity during flu season to give flu vaccines to all eligible persons, including essential workers and persons at increased risk for severe illness from [COVID-19](#) or [influenza](#).

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
