Updated Guidelines on the Use of Directly Observed Therapy (DOT) Packets for Patient Self-Administration

In December 2017, the DSHS Pharmacy Branch sought clarification from the Texas State Board of Pharmacy (TSBP) regarding the provision of DOT packets for patient self-administration (i.e. weekend/holiday doses, video DOT, etc.).

The TSBP recommendations are to reclassify DOT packets to fall under physician provision of medications per Texas Occupations Code, Title 3, Chapter 158. This states a physician may provide medications to a patient, free of charge, as part of an indigent pharmaceutical program for adherence to a course of treatment.

When physicians provide medications in this manner, there are labeling requirements that must be met in accordance with Texas Dangerous Drug Act, Section 483.042(a)(2)).

These are:

- The name and address of the medical director or physician who prescribed the drug;
- The date the drug is delivered to the patient;
- The patient's name; and,
- The name, strength and directions for use of the drug(s).

This label must be placed on each Ziploc bag containing the DOT packets with the required information printed or handwritten by the clinician/nurse at the time medication is provided to the patient.

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Frequently Asked Questions

Does this mean we can return to ordering packets for VDOT instead of the individual bottles?

Yes. DOT packets can be provided to the patient for self-administration as long as the above labeling requirements are met.

What about weekend/holiday/vacation doses?

These doses can be provided using DOT packets. Again, make sure the label meets the requirements above. If a small, child-resistant container for weekend doses is needed, you may order amber prescription vials through ITEAMS. Otherwise, you may provide medications in amber-colored bags (not child-resistant) provided by the DSHS Pharmacy Branch.

Will we see any changes in what DSHS Pharmacy Branch provides to us?

Yes, beginning March 19, 2018, DOT packets will be sent out in light-resistant, amber zip closure bags instead of clear plastic bags. These bags are not child-resistant, but block ultraviolet light exposure to the medications.

What about child-resistant closures?

These new amber zip closure bags will NOT be child-resistant. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission's guide for Poison Prevention Packaging, "the medical provider has the authority to specify non-complying packaging for his/her patients". Non-complying packaging means not child-resistant. If child-resistant packaging is desired, the amber prescription vials are available for order from the Pharmacy Branch in ITEAMS.
