The Texas Vaccine Outreach and Education Grant program, is a partnership between Texas A&M Health and the Texas Department of State Health Services Immunization Unit to fund strategies that ensure greater knowledge of and access to COVID-19 vaccines by those disproportionately affected by COVID-19.

Community-based organizations (CBOs) will be awarded funds up to \$150,000 to engage their community in proactive COVID-19 vaccine education and outreach

activities with the goal of increasing the number of people fully vaccinated for COVID-19 in Texas.

Dear Texercise Partner,

Texas Health and Human Services Commission is committed to connecting older Texans and Texans with disabilities (including people who are homebound, have limited transportation options) with resources for accessing COVID-19 vaccinations. Resources include:

- **State Mobile Vaccine Program** provides a way for Texas businesses and people who are homebound to schedule mobile vaccinations.
 - *Texas businesses or civic organizations* with five or more employees, visitors, or members who voluntarily choose to be vaccinated. Call 844-90-TEXAS (844-908-3927) and select Option 3 to schedule a visit from a state mobile vaccine team.

- *Texans who are homebound* can call the same number and select **Option 1** to request a state mobile vaccination team to come to their home.
- **Texas Public Health Vaccine Scheduler** The new Texas Vaccine Scheduler helps Texans get scheduled for a COVID-19 vaccine at clinics hosted by participating Texas public health entities. Register online at [GetTheVaccine.dshs.texas.gov](https://www.getthevaccine.dshs.texas.gov) and you will be notified by email or text on the specifics to get the vaccine. If there's not a clinic near you, you will be directed to other sites to get a vaccine.
- **Disability Rights Texas Hotline (DRTx Vaccine Hotline)** provides assistance to people with disabilities needing assistance in accessing COVID-19 vaccine. Contact the DRTx Vaccine Hotline at 1-800-880-8401 or email at vaccine@DRTx.org.

- **Retail Pharmacy Program** is a federal program that is doubling the amount of pharmacies receiving the vaccine. Visit [CDC's Federal Retail Pharmacy Program website](#) to find out which pharmacies are participating.
- **Transportation Assistance** through Lyft and Uber.
 - **Lyft** is providing ride codes specifically for older adults for up to \$25 (each way) to their vaccine appointment. Older adults can

use **SENIORVAX1** when scheduling a ride for their first dose and **SENIORVAX2** when scheduling a ride for their second dose.

Putting Men's Health Care Disparities on the Map: Examining Racial and Ethnic Disparities at the State Level

Publisher: Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation

Abstract

This report finds that men of color in almost every state continue to fare worse than white men on a variety of measures of health, health care access, and other social determinants of health. It documents the persistence of such disparities between white men and men of color -- and among different groups within men of color -- on 22 indicators of health and well-being, including rates of diseases such as AIDS, cancer, heart disease, and diabetes, as well as insurance coverage and health screenings. It also catalogs disparities in factors that influence health and access to care such as income and education.

As part of the broader goal of increasing access to care for mothers and babies in Texas, the Texas Collaborative for Healthy Mothers and Babies has developed a reference sheet to empower frontline workers in assisting low-income, uninsured women in Texas who may qualify for the main public healthcare coverage programs (Medicaid for Pregnant Women, CHIP-Perinatal, Healthy Texas Women and the Family Planning Program).

The reference sheet is intended to help close knowledge gaps, encourage greater utilization of available resources, and increase access to healthcare. It has been developed in collaboration with stakeholders through an ongoing co-design process that has included focus groups, interviews, and a dedicated workgroup.

ITCHY PLANTS

By now you should have noticed that poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac are everywhere. They grow in wooded places across Texas. Poison Ivy and poison oak grow as vines or shrub and poison sumac is usually a shrub or tree. They say "leaves of three, leave it be" but that only applies to poison ivy and poison oak. Poison Sumac leaves grow in clusters of 7-13 leaves with one by itself at the end.

Technically speaking, the plants aren't really poisonous but rather carry a sticky oil called urushiol, that causes the itchy, blistering rash after it comes in contact with the skin. Even the slightest contact like brushing up against the leaves, can cause a reaction to the skin. The rash usually shows up in the first 24-72 hours, peaks within a week, and can last for up to 3 weeks.

In rare cases, people develop a more severe reaction to poison ivy called "Black-Spot Poison Ivy," which causes black spots or streaks to the skin. This is caused when an uncommon reaction between the urushiol sap and exposure to oxygen and moisture, comes in contact with the skin.

To protect yourself, consider the following:

- Keep your skin covered to avoid contact with these plants.
- Wear a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, gloves, and closed shoes if you're in an area where they grow
- Urushiol begins to stick within minutes. If you know you've made contact with poison ivy, oak, or sumac, wash the area with lukewarm water and soap ASAP.



WESTERN DIAMONDBACK RATTLESNAKE



There are four kinds of venomous snakes in Texas: coral snakes, copperheads, cottonmouths (water moccasins) and rattlesnakes. In this newsletter we will focus on the infamous Western Diamondback Rattlesnake.

In Texas, there are 10 species of rattlesnakes. The Western Diamondback Rattlesnake easily rates as one of the most dangerous snakes in the U.S. This species causes more fatalities than any other snake in the United States. It's venom is considered to be Hemotoxic, which means it affects the blood and can damage the tissue.

Appearance:

- Heavy-bodied snake
- Triangular-shaped head
- Two dark diagonal lines on each side of its face running from the eyes to its jaws
- Dark diamond-shaped patterns along its back
- The tail has black and white bands just above the rattles
- Adults vary between 32-74 inches (81-188 cm) on average

Symptoms:

- Intense pain
- Edema & swelling
- Bleeding disorders
- Numbness & weakness
- Increase heart rate, vomiting & confusion

Treatment:

- Call the Poison Center at 1-800-222-1222 for instructions on all snakebites.
- *All snakebites should be examined and treated by a physician*
- If bitten, note time of the bite, remove jewelry or other items that might constrict swelling, and remain calm.
- Do not try to capture the snake.
- Do not cut the wound and try to extract the venom.
- Do not use ice or a tourniquet.
- Do not take pain relievers or other medications without first seeking medical advice. Do not drink alcohol.
