



This update presents data for the 91 vocational nursing (VN) programs and the military-based VN program¹ in Texas during the 2017 reporting year, including:

- 85 generic programs
 - 65 in public colleges/universities
 - 13 in career schools/colleges
 - 4 in private colleges/universities
 - 3 in private/public hospitals
- 5 Multiple Entry/Exit Programs (MEEPs)
 - All in public colleges/universities
- 1 military-based program¹

The Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) collected data in the 2017 Board of Nursing's (BON) Nursing Education Program Information Survey (NEPIS) that was available online as of October 2, 2017. The reporting period was academic year (AY) 2016-2017 (September 1, 2016 – August 31, 2017) unless otherwise noted. TCNWS collaborated with the BON in the design and dissemination of the survey.

¹Data collected from the military-based VN program were analyzed separately.


Newly Enrolled Students in Vocational Nursing Programs

Race/Ethnicity

Figure 1 shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the newly enrolled VN students compared to the Texas VN workforce and the projected Texas population in 2017. Figure 2 (page 2) shows the racial/ethnic trends of newly enrolled VN students. Race/ethnicity data were missing for 0.9% of newly enrolled VN students.

- The proportion of white/Caucasian newly enrolled VN students in Texas (33.3%) was lower than the proportion of whites/Caucasians in the VN workforce (47.8%) and in the projected Texas resident population (40.9%).
- 21.9% of newly enrolled VN students were black/African American, which was approximately double the proportion in the Texas resident population (11.4%), but similar to the Texas VN workforce (24.0%).
- The proportion of newly enrolled VN students (40.6%) who were Hispanic/Latino was higher than the proportion in the VN workforce (25.0%), but was similar to the proportion of Hispanics/Latinos in the projected Texas resident population (41.0%).

Figure 1. Race/Ethnicity of Newly Enrolled VN Students, Texas VN Workforce², and Texas Population³, 2017




Sex

The newly enrolled VN student population was predominately female: 87.3% of newly enrolled VN students were female in AY 2016-2017. Gender data were missing for 0.2% of newly enrolled VN students.

Figure 2. Race/Ethnicity Trends of Newly Enrolled VN Students, 2010-2017




Age

Figure 3 presents the breakdown of newly enrolled VN students by age. Age data were missing for 0.04% of newly enrolled VN students.

- The majority (63.8%) of newly enrolled VN students were 30 years or younger.
- 24.3% of newly enrolled students were between the ages of 31 and 40.

- 11.9% of newly enrolled VN students were 41 years or older.

International Students

- Programs reported a total of 85 newly enrolled international students⁴ (1.3% of all newly enrolled VN students).

⁴International was defined as a person who is not a citizen or permanent resident of the United States and who is in this country on a temporary basis and does not have the right to remain indefinitely.


Graduates from Vocational Nursing Programs

Race/Ethnicity

Figure 4 shows the racial/ethnic distribution of VN graduates compared to the Texas VN workforce and the projected Texas resident population in 2017. Figure 5 (page 3) shows the racial/ethnic trends of VN graduates.

- The proportion of VN graduates (37.5%) who were white/Caucasian was lower than both the proportion in the VN workforce (47.8%) and in the projected Texas resident population (40.9%).
- The proportion of black/African American VN graduates (19.8%) was higher than the proportion of black/African American Texas residents (11.4%), but lower than the proportion of black/African American nurses in the VN workforce (24.0%).
- Like the newly enrolled VN student population, the proportion of VN graduates who were Hispanic/Latino (37.4%) was greater than the proportion in the Texas VN workforce (25.0%), and lower than the Texas resident population (41.0%).


The graduates from VN programs were also predominately female (87.9%).

Figure 5. Race/Ethnicity Trends of VN Graduates, 2010-2017




Age

Figure 6 illustrates VN graduates by age.

- The majority (64.5%) of VN graduates were 30 years or younger.
- 11.2% of VN graduates were aged 41 and older.

International Graduates

- Programs reported a total of 20 international graduates⁴ (0.5% of all VN graduates).

Military-Based VN Program Demographics


Newly Enrolled Students & Graduates

Race/Ethnicity

Figure 7 shows the racial/ethnic distribution of newly enrolled students and graduates from the military-based VN program compared to the 2017 Texas VN workforce.

- The proportions of white/Caucasian newly enrolled VN students (44.8%) and graduates (47.0%) in the military-based VN program were similar to the Texas VN workforce (47.8%).
- Black/African American newly enrolled students (19.1%) and graduates (16.0%) were both lower in proportion compared to the Texas VN workforce (24.0%).
- Hispanic/Latino newly enrolled students (17.5%) and graduates (17.0%) were also lower in proportion compared to the Texas VN workforce (25.0%).
- The proportion of newly enrolled students who were other races/ethnicities (18.6%) was lower than the proportion of graduates (20.0%) and both were more than five times greater than the Texas VN workforce (3.2%).

Sex

Unlike other VN programs, newly enrolled students and graduates from the military-based VN program were predominately male: 59.9% and 62.1%, respectively.

Age

The majority of newly enrolled students (89.2%) and graduates (87.7%) were 30 years or younger.
