

STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS IN PROFESSIONAL NURSING PROGRAMS

This update presents information for the 133 pre-licensure registered nursing (RN) programs in Texas during the 2025 reporting year, including:

- 1 diploma program;
- 68 Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) programs, including 56 generic ADN programs and 12 licensed vocational nurse (LVN) to ADN stand-alone programs;
- 62 Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs; and
- 2 Master of Science in Nursing Alternate Entry (MSN AE) programs.

The Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) collected data using the 2025 Board of Nursing's (BON) Nursing Education Program Information Survey (NEPIS) that was available online as of October 1, 2025. The reporting period was academic year (AY) 2024-2025 (September 1, 2024 – August 31, 2025) unless otherwise noted. TCNWS collaborated with the BON in the design and dissemination of the survey.

Graduates from Professional Nursing Programs

Sex

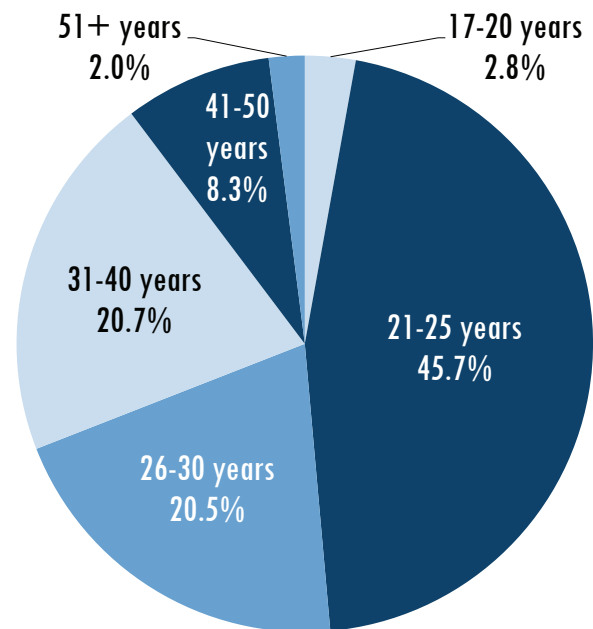
In 2025, there were 16,221 graduates from professional nursing programs. This population was predominantly female: 84.5% in AY 2024-2025, which is 1% less than the proportion of graduates that were female in AY 2023-2024. Sex data were missing for 0.1% of RN graduates.

Age

Figure 1 illustrates the AY 2024-2025 RN graduate breakdown by age. Age data were missing for 0.1% of RN graduates.

- The largest proportion of graduates was between 21 and 25 years of age (45.7%).
- The second largest age group was graduates aged 31-40 years (20.7%), followed by 26-30 years (20.5%). Graduates aged 41 and older made up 10.3% of RN graduates.
- BSN programs had the largest proportion of graduates who were 25 or younger (61.0% of BSN graduates).
- 65.9% of LVN to ADN graduates were 31 years of age or older.

Race/Ethnicity

Figure 2 displays the race/ethnicity distribution of RN graduates in comparison to the race/ethnicity distribution of the RN workforce and the projected 2025 Texas population. Race/ethnicity data were missing for 2.6% of RN graduates.

- The percentage of RN graduates who were White/Caucasian (33.8%) was less than the 2025 Texas population (37.8%) and less than that of the 2025 RN workforce (47.4%).
- The percentage of Black/African American RN graduates (15.8%) was higher than the proportion of the Black/African American persons in the 2025 Texas population (11.9%) and the percentage within the 2025 RN workforce (13.8%).
- The proportion of RN graduates who were Hispanic/Latino (37.5%) was lower than the proportion of Hispanics/Latinos in the 2025 Texas population (39.7%), but greater than the proportion of Hispanic/Latino nurses in the 2025 RN workforce (22.6%).
- The percentage of Asian RN graduates (8.8%) was greater than the percentage of Asian individuals in the 2025 Texas population (5.3%), but lower than the 2025 RN workforce (12.5%).
- There were greater percentages of RN graduates (4.1%) in the “other” race/ethnicity category than the proportion within the Texas population (2.4%).

Figure 2. Race/Ethnicity of RN Graduates, Texas RN Workforce,¹ and Texas Population,² 2025

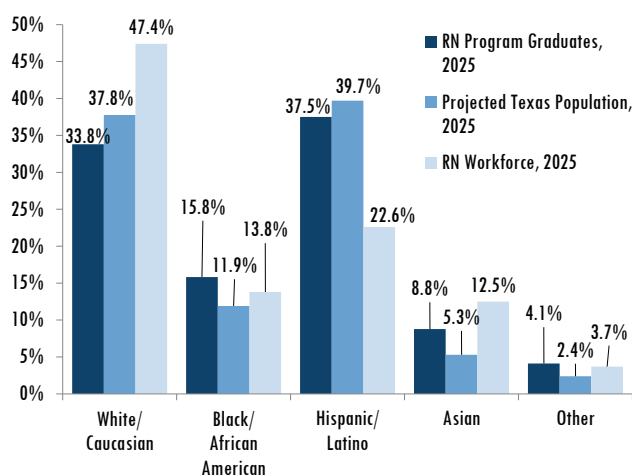
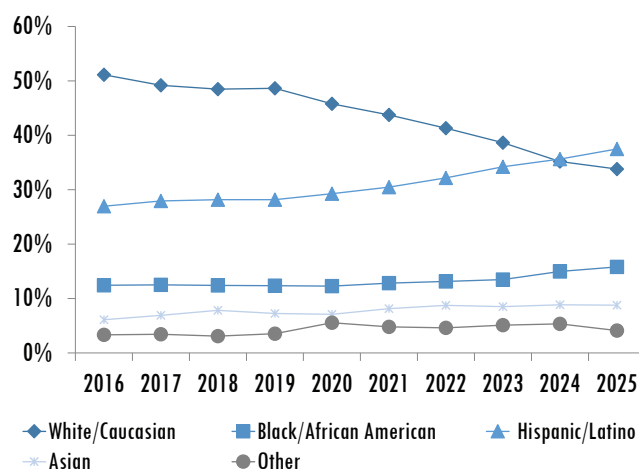


Figure 3 shows the race/ethnicity trends of RN graduates from 2016 to 2025. The proportion of RN graduates who were White/Caucasian has decreased while the percentage of students who were Hispanic/Latino or Black/African American has increased.

- RN graduates are increasingly reflecting the race/ethnicity distribution of the Texas population.

International Students³

Programs reported a total of 187 graduates who were international students (1.2% of all RN graduates). This proportion has remained relatively consistent in the past years.
