Dr. Protas welcomed the council members present, who introduced themselves.</li> <li>A quorum was established.</li> <li>Dr. Protas requested excused absences for Dr. Lalji and Dr. Sherman.</li> <li>A motion to approve excused absences was made by Ms. Wynne and seconded by Mr. Zakaria. Health outcomes and healthy behaviors <ul> <li>Vaccines</li> <li>The council discussed reducing the number of individuals that opt-out of requirements.</li> <li>Dr. Deshpande brought up, and the council discussed, the effect of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) on immunizations. Families are reducing their in-person visits, and this is leading to delays and missing immunizations.</li> <li>Similarly, the council discussed the lack of access to care due to the pandemic, such as missing well-checks.</li> <li>Ms. Wynne discussed pharmacists administering vaccines and the administration of vaccines at Women, Infants and Children sites as solutions to increase access for low-income people.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Maternal and child health         <ul> <li>The council reiterated the desire to recommend the expansion of Medicaid coverage for postpartum women.</li> <li>The council discussed the importance of Medicaid coverage, as it is likely that more women will give birth on Medicaid in the upcoming months due to COVID-19.</li> <li>The council discussed the failure of this type of legislation to pass in the 2019 legislative</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

	session and challenges in the next session due
	to economic issues. They also discussed including financial data to strengthen the case for 12-months postpartum Medicaid expansion.

	<ul> <li>The council discussed the impact of COVID-19 on the food chain and how children and families are experiencing increased food insecurity, especially with the loss of school lunches.</li> <li>The council also discussed the impact of COVID- 19 on physical activity, including the effect of park and activity space closures.</li> <li>The council discussed making a statement that research should be done on the effect of COVID- 19 on physical activity.</li> </ul>
