1. Chairman's Welcome and Introductions	Dr. Protas called the meeting to order at 10:04 a.m. Dr. Bledsoe announced that members should state their name for the record when making comments and to mute themselves when not speaking.
2. Establish a Quorum – Roll Call and Possible Action to Approve Excused Absences	A quorum was established. Jimmy Blanton requested an excused absence.
3. SHCC Discussion and Possible Action to Approve October 14, 2021 Meeting Minutes	A review of the March 3, 2022 minutes elicited no revisions. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Dr. Boswell and seconded by Dr. Zeid. The motion carried.
4. SHCC Review of Policy Recommendations for the 2023-2028 Statewide Health Plan	<ul> <li>The SHCC discussed the Policy Recommendations of the 2023-2028 Statewide Health Plan.</li> <li>a. Access to Care, Health Equity, and Social Determinants of Health: <ul> <li>Dr. Wynne stated the importance of having a healthcare workforce that demographically represents the community they serve.</li> <li>Dr. Zeid commented that there's many reasons that Medicaid is limited for those who need it. This problem is alleviated for now because of Covid-19 policies, but as soon as funding for Covid-19 is over, many will lose healthcare.</li> <li>Dr. Haynes asked whether there is a section examining patient-doctor ratio with the number of providers that are taking Medicaid and how that affects access to health.</li> <li>Dr. Zeid addressed the reimbursement rates for Medicaid and how Texas compares to surrounding states.</li> </ul> </li> <li>b. Mental Health and Behavioral Healthcare Workforce: <ul> <li>The Uvalde mass shooting was brought up during this section, but since it was not on the agenda, the council could not address it at this time. Dr. Protas mentioned it could be a great topic for a following meeting.</li> <li>Dr. Rodriguez suggested more trauma-informed care and how to address PTSD for children in schools.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

<ul> <li>Dr. Harvey states she's in agreement with all the</li> </ul>
recommendations on the slides and where funds should be allocated.
<ul> <li>Dr. Wynne wanted to state wanted to speak on the role of Texas schools and working with students.</li> </ul>
Further discussions after this will encompass
students and their families, but we also need to
include educators.
<ul> <li>Dr. Harvey stated she's in agreement with Dr.</li> </ul>
Wynne's comments. Mental health first aid training
offered by the state targets educators and those
working in public school system. There are adult,
teen, and child components. There are more efforts to make the Youth Aware Mental health (YAM)
training robust and accessible.
<ul> <li>Dr. Boswell wanted to make everyone aware that</li> </ul>
we're on the third cycle of nurse workforce violence
and that it might be beneficial to implement some of
those programs to address violence in schools.
Dr. Sparks spoke about needing more mental health
services in higher education and specified that
recommendations for students should dictate all levels.
c. Rural Communities and Health:
Dr. Wynne asked if there could be any collaboration
in rural areas to encourage their employees to be
vaccinated. April 2022 ended the term for free
vaccines, though. The loss of insurance for many in
rural areas will affect vaccine rates.
<ul> <li>Dr. Protas agreed. She spoke with Dr. Tim Benton who runs CareVan which goes to oil businesses in</li> </ul>
the panhandle and Texas Tech University. He's
been invited to the next meeting to speak on how
this program can improve rural health.
d. Telehealth and Technology:
<ul> <li>Dr. Sparks asked whether the recommendations</li> </ul>
could include rural libraries locations for kiosks.
<ul> <li>Dr. Boswell stated that while telehealth is great for some groups of people, but not geriatric patients.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Dr. Haynes provided that the E-Health Advisory</li> </ul>
Committee had been discussing telehealth and
technology. Literacy and cost of broadband are
concerns.
• Dr. Rhodes spoke about the benefit of telehealth in
the panhandle area in multiple populations.
Providers have seen a lot of success in increased

	<ul> <li>patients with decreased travel times. Parents are doing much more for their children's health. Their elderly population isn't as familiar, so we could introduce a liaison present to help them embrace it.</li> <li>Dr. Hunt spoke about the urgent care system at Texas Children's in Houston where they have their own department for Telehealth. She suggested creating more facilities for people to visit after telehealth appointments.</li> <li>Dr. Wynne suggested training for patients on how to use telehealth services. Community health workers are increasing as a workforce and could assist geriatric patients.</li> <li>Dr. Sparks stated that telehealth relates heavily to rural communities, but specialties often don't want to come out to rural areas.</li> <li>Dr. Protas asked for a motion to approve the policy recommendations for the 2023-2028 Statewide Health Plan.</li> <li>Dr. Harvey made the motion, and the motion was seconded by Keen United and the motio</li></ul>

	<ul> <li>the HHSC's report was two-fold: it covered HHSC's continued dedicated to mental health services and the services provided by HHSC to Uvalde.</li> <li>The Disaster Behavioral Health Services Team deployed to the community to offer support in partnership with the Texas Council of Community Centers, Hill Country Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities, and the Harris Center for Mental Health and IDD. Together, they created the Uvalde Support Line. Hill Country Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities also launched a website (www.UvaldeStrong2022.org) to list available services and supports.</li> <li>HHSC continues to focus on policy, providing services, training, technical assistance across several areas: recruiting and retaining a qualified behavioral health workforce, the implementation of the 988 Suicide Prevention Lifeline, behavioral health services for youth with complex needs, crisis prevention, intervention, and treatment, and continuing to expand community psychiatric hospital beds.</li> </ul>

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB): <ul> <li>Elizabeth Mayer gave updates on a few grant programs. Awards for the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Graduate Medical Education Expansion Grant Program were made in January.</li> <li>The Family Practice Residency Advisory Committee recently met to determine the funding for 2023.</li> <li>The Nursing Shortage Reduction Program: THECB is the process of finalizing the contracting process for programs receiving funds.</li> <li>The UT Tyler Medical School has been approved by the board at the January meeting, and they'll begin oprolling students in fall 2022</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Dr. Bledsoe discussed the following items:         <ul> <li>HPRC staff have been working on the 2023-2028 Statewide Health Plan and have finished the SB18 Report, which covers physician supply and demand.</li> <li>HPRC is undergoing a large data transfer process that should allow them to do more robust research on different healthcare professions.</li> <li>They've been fulfilling data requests and hired one new Research Specialist III.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Cate Campbell provided an update on the Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies (TCNWS) and discussed the following items:         <ul> <li>TCNWS will have their Advisory Committee meeting on July 13, 2022, to give updates and receive updates from the represented organizations on the committee.</li> <li>Nursing education reports have been approved by the TCNWS Advisory Committee and are published on the TCNWS website.</li> <li>Updated nursing education dashboards are on Texas Health Data.</li> <li>The 2022 Staffing Studies, which cover hospitals, long-term each and health and health and and and and and and and and and and</li></ul></li></ul>
