EMS Scholarship Program Takes Off

The Texas Legislature set aside funds to educate and train EMS personnel, paving the way for the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) to offer education scholarships and increase the EMS workforce in Texas. The Regional Advisory Councils (RACs) are partnering with DSHS to distribute scholarships to licensed EMS providers or licensed EMS education programs.

To date, over \$6 million in scholarships have been processed. This equates to over 1,100 new or upgraded EMS personnel!

What's Happening Now

The Regional Advisory Councils (RACs) have been instrumental in the success of this initiative. They have tailored their programs to fit their regional needs and continue to be an integral piece of the EMS recruitment and retention effort in our state.

- To date, over \$6 million in EMS education scholarships have been processed. This equates to over 1,100 new or upgraded EMS personnel and it's just the beginning!
- From February 13 to March 31, 2023, the Department ran a digital ad campaign designed to increase EMS career awareness in urban & rural areas of Texas. The ads had 39.6 million impressions, reached over 5.5 million unique email addresses, and more than 306,236 people clicked on the ads to be redirected to the EMS Scholarships and Careers website.

Texas EMS System Move to Version 3.5



The Texas EMS system is moving to V3.5 National Emergency Medical Services Information System (NEMSIS) later in 2023, and the whole nation will move to V3.5 by January 1, 2024.

EMS Providers are encouraged to begin now to .develop an implementation plan for V3.5 data standard. EMS software vendors continue to develop products to support the V3.5 standard.






PASS PERCENTAGES




Stroke Awareness Month

EMS Application Processing

Turnaround times on applications for the second quarter (Dec, Jan, Feb) of Fiscal Year 2023.

Factors that contribute to processing time

- Renewal applications for EMS personnel and educators are opened six months before the expiration date; the open time contributes to the processing time.
- Initial provider and first responder applicants undergo surveys and inspection before a license is issued.
- Renewal applications for EMS providers and first responders are opened three months before the expiration date; the open time contributes to the processing time.

A few things to remember when renewing your EMS certification or license:

EMS personnel

- Don't wait for your name to appear on the fingerprint list.
- Don't wait until the last day of the month to submit your application.

EMS providers

• Don't wait until the last minute to update or obtain your letter of credit from your banking institution. You should obtain your letter 90 days before your expiration date.

• The certificate, license, or approval expires at midnight of the expiration date if the department doesn't receive a renewal application and the correct amount of renewal fee, or it only receives the application but not the full amount of the renewal fee prior to midnight of the expiration date.

• An untimely filed EMS provider renewal application will require the applicant to file an initial application and meet EMS provider license requirements in effect for an initial applicant at that time.





Facility Designations




The graphs further characterize application types by the number of facilities applying for initial designation and the currently designated facilities seeking re-designation.

Updates Regulations • Programs • Funding

88 Regular Legislative Session

As we head toward the end of the 88th legislative session, this has proven to be a very interesting post-COVID session in Texas. Legislators drafted and introduced thousands of bills that could benefit or impact the Texas EMS system. Special thanks to the Texas EMS Trauma & Acute Care Foundation (TETAF), Texas Ambulance Association, and Texas EMS Alliance, as these dedicated groups continue educating our legislators on Texas's emergency healthcare system.

When we work together for the same goal, we gain benefits similar to Senate Bill 8 from the last session, which provided \$21.7 million for scholarships to increase our EMS workforce. To review a bill or listen to a hearing, visit capitol.texas.gov/.

Maternal Rules Adopted (H.B. 1164 and S.B. 749)

The maternal rules were published for adoption in the Texas Register on December 13, 2022. They became effective January 1, 2023. Surveys scheduled after April 1, 2023, will follow the new maternal rules. Facilities that have focused reviews after April 2, 2023, will be accountable to the new designation requirements.

The new rules and survey process are continuing to be discussed during the monthly perinatal calls with the department to provide clarification, guidance, and answer any questions.

RULES

Neonatal Rule Amendments (S.B. 749)

The proposed neonatal rule was reviewed by the Executive Council on February 16, 2023. The formal public comment period was concluded. The department worked with the Perinatal Advisory Council (PAC) workgroup to review all public comments has for revisions to the proposed rule. The anticipated adoption of the proposed neonatal rules is May 15, 2023. The implementation date for the new rules is January 1, 2024. All neonatal surveys after January 1, 2024, will follow the new designation requirements. All focused surveys occurring after January 1, 2024, will follow the new rules.

Trauma Rule Amendments

The proposed trauma rule amendments are scheduled for the Executive Council Meeting in August of 2023. The anticipated formal public comment period for the proposed trauma rule amendments is September through October, of 2023. All formal public comments will be reviewed by the department and the defined workgroup representing the Governor's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Trauma Advisory Council (GETAC) Trauma Systems Committee, and Regional Advisory Council (RAC) leaders. The anticipated adoption date is January of 2024. Trauma facilities will be held accountable to the new rules and designation requirements beginning July of 2024. All focus reviews scheduled after July 1, 2024, will follow the new designation requirements.

The Regional Advisory Council requirements and contract will align with the adopted rule and requirements beginning with the September 2024 contract.

It is important to note that the American College of Surgeons will implement their 2022 Verification Standards September 1, 2023.
