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# 1. Introduction

[Texas Health and Safety Code Section 161.0041](#) requires a person claiming an exemption from a required immunization based on reasons of conscience, including a religious belief, to complete an affidavit on a form provided by the Department of State Health Services (DSHS). DSHS is required to maintain a record of the total number of affidavit forms sent out and report that information to the Legislature each year.

[Texas Education Code Section 51.9192](#) requires DSHS to develop and implement a secure internet-based process to allow public junior college students to apply for an exemption from the bacterial meningitis (meningococcal) vaccination requirement for reasons of conscience, including a religious belief. Each year, DSHS is required to report to the Legislature the number of exemptions applied for in the preceding year.

This report captures the total number of conscientious exemptions from required immunizations requested between September 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021.

## 2. Background

### Vaccine Requirements in Texas

In order to attend child-care facilities, elementary and secondary schools, and institutions of higher education in Texas, students and children must receive age-appropriate vaccinations. High vaccination rates are important to protect the individuals who are vaccinated, those who are too young to be vaccinated, those who cannot be vaccinated due to medical reasons, and those who receive vaccines but do not develop adequate immunity. Table 1 below outlines Texas' vaccine requirements as defined by state statutes and rules. Specific vaccination requirements by age, institution, and field of study can be found in [25 Texas Administrative Code \(TAC\) §97.63](#), [25 TAC §97.64](#), and [19 TAC §21.613](#).

## Conscientious Exemption Requests

In accordance with [Texas Health and Safety Code Section 161.0041](#), Texas allows exemptions from child care facility and elementary/secondary school vaccine requirements due to reasons of conscience, including religious beliefs. An adult student or a minor's parent or guardian seeking a conscientious exemption from one or more vaccine requirements must request an affidavit form from the Department of State Health Services (DSHS).

After processing the request, DSHS mails the affidavit form(s) to the requestor. The affidavit form must then be signed, notarized, and submitted by the requestor to the student's school or child's child-care facility. Affidavits are valid for two years from the date of notarization. As specified in the Health and Safety Code, DSHS may not maintain a record of the names of individuals who request an affidavit.

Additionally, in accordance with [Texas Education Code Section 51.9192\(d-3\)](#), public junior college students, or their parent or guardian if they are a minor, may request an exemption from the bacterial meningitis vaccine through the DSHS-maintained [Exemption from Meningococcal Vaccination Requirements](#) online portal. The application must be completed online, printed, signed, and submitted to the institution's designated office for overseeing compliance with the vaccine requirement. The application form provides a statement informing applicants of the benefits and risks of receiving or not receiving the immunization.

### 3. Conscientious Exemption Affidavits Requested, Fiscal Year 2021

During fiscal year 2021, a total of 115,675 individuals requested a conscientious exemption from at least one vaccine requirement for childcare facilities and elementary/secondary schools. This represents a 50.5 percent increase over fiscal year 2020. Table 2 below shows the data collected over the past five fiscal years.

<sup>1</sup> DSHS’s fiscal year starts September 1 and extends through August 31 of the following year. For example, fiscal year 2021 began September 1, 2020 and ended August 31, 2021.

## 4. Bacterial Meningitis Conscientious Exemptions Requested, Fiscal Year 2021

During fiscal year 2021, the Department of State Health Services' (DSHS) internet-based portal processed a total of 31,865 conscientious exemption requests from the bacterial meningitis vaccination for public junior college students. This represents an eight percent decrease from fiscal year 2020. Table 3 below shows the total number of conscientious exemptions processed each year since fiscal year 2017.

## 5. Conclusion

Over the past five years, Texas has seen a sharp increase in requests for affidavits for conscientious exemptions from vaccine requirements. Although requests for the conscientious exemptions to the bacterial meningitis vaccine required for public junior college students have declined in the last two fiscal years, there was a sharp increase in the number of requests for conscientious exemption affidavits that cover all other state-required vaccines in fiscal year 2021.

In fiscal year 2020, 34,628 public junior college students requested a bacterial meningitis vaccination conscientious exemption, a 36.6 percent decrease from fiscal year 2019, and a 38.9 percent decrease since fiscal year 2016.

A separate, Texas DSHS-supplied conscientious exemption affidavit covers all other state-required vaccines. In fiscal year 2020, 76,839 individuals requested the conscientious exemption affidavit that covers those vaccines, but that number notably jumped to 115,675 in fiscal year 2021. This is a 50.5 percent increase over fiscal year 2020 and a 79 percent increase since fiscal year 2017. This jump continues an ongoing upward trend in requests for these conscientious exemption affidavits.
