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Introduction

[Senate Bill \(S.B.\) 1, 89th Legislature, Regular Session, 2025 \(Article II, Department of State Health Services \(DSHS\), Rider 32\)](#) designated \$13 million in General Revenue for the 2026–27 biennium for DSHS to implement a pilot program focused on protecting human health by reducing the population of cats and dogs at risk for unplanned breeding that may carry infectious diseases. Rider 32 requires authorized DSHS to contract with qualified entities to ensure the use of effective and humane methods.

DSHS launched the Texas Spay and Neuter Pilot Program in January 2026 using an open enrollment application process. Eligible entities included municipal and county shelters, private animal shelters, 501(c) nonprofit organizations, animal rescue entities, and veterinary clinics.

DSHS reviewed applications on a first-come, first-served basis and considered geographic factors to ensure statewide coverage. Award amounts were based on each participating entity's sized and proposed activities, with awards ranging from \$50,000 to \$1,000,000 for the 2026-27 biennium.

Rider 32 requires DSHS to submit an annual report each fiscal year of the 2026-27 biennium beginning September 1, 2026, that includes:

- the number and location of animals treated;
- health outcomes related to disease prevention;
- program expenditures, and
- strategies for program expansion and improvement.

This report is based on one quarter of contractor reporting, which limits the amount of information available to meet the September 1, 2026, deadline. The FY 2027 report will include more complete data, including more details about outcomes, disease trends, and performance measures.

Fiscal Year 2026 Grant Program Update

DSHS awarded a total of \$12,231,414 for the 2026-27 biennium to 38 applicants. Awards supported diverse statewide, regional, and local animal health care providers across urban, rural, and underserved geographical areas. The remainder of the funding supported four full-time employees responsible for contract oversight and invoice processing.

All contracts are effective March 2026 through August 31, 2027. Participating entities must submit monthly invoices and quarterly reports, which include the:

- Number and type of spay and neuter procedures that entities performed;
- Amount DSHS has reimbursed entities; and
- List of counties where entities provided spay and neuter services.

Table 1 below summarizes FY 2026 Spay and Neuter Pilot Program activities reported by participating contractors. The table includes each contractor's name, award amount, counties served, number of animals treated, and amount expended as of June 2026.

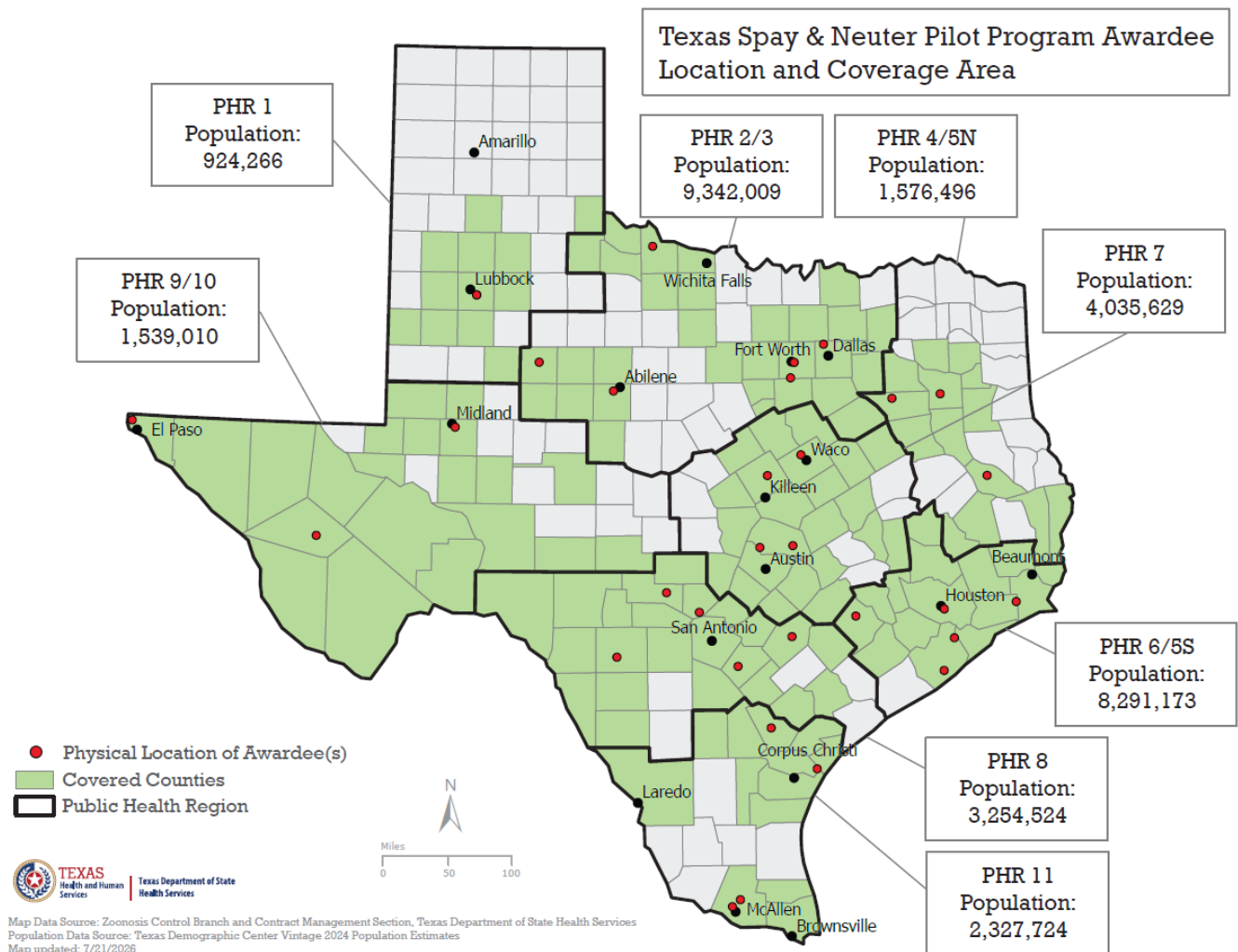

As of June 2026, the 38 contractors report treating over 14,000 animals in 152 counties. While the total expenditures in June were relatively low, DSHS largely attributes this to the ramp up time needed for these contractors to expand their activities. The FY 2027 report will contain updated figures for the complete contracting period and will also contain data about health outcomes.

Strategies for Program Expansion and Improvement

To help gauge the success of DSHS approaches to implementing Rider 32, DSHS recorded feedback from contractors and stakeholders on ways to improve the program if appropriations continue. Of note, this information is based on one quarter of contract activities and DSHS expects more details will emerge as entities complete their contract periods.

Contractors and stakeholders indicate ongoing demand for low-cost spay and neuter services. They indicate that this support for spay and neuter services achieves positive outcomes, including reduced overpopulation, fewer unplanned litters, increased adoption activity, and improved animal health. Some stakeholders recommend that any future iterations of the program prioritize underserved and rural regions with limited veterinary services.

DSHS will continue outreach efforts through the DSHS website and social media platforms to improve pet owner awareness of the program and ensure access to these low-cost spay and neuter services. DSHS will also actively collect feedback and more information as the program progresses and provide those details in the FY 2027 report.

Conclusion

DSHS implemented Rider 32 through an open enrollment contracting process and considered geographic factors and coverage in the awards process. DSHS continues to monitor contractor performance through required quarterly reporting.

While the data in this report is limited, DSHS expects the final report for the 2026-2027 biennium to contain more complete data and information on health outcomes and disease trends. Contractors have expressed an ongoing demand for low-cost spay and neuter services in their covered areas, and DSHS will continue to monitor contractor expenditures and offer technical assistance as warranted.
