



Goals of the Peer Mentorship Program

 Provide an introductory level course to increase knowledge and skills in independently navigating adult healthcare and community supports relevant for adults with IDD

- Practice goal setting, problem solving, and self-advocacy skills
- Provide an opportunity to build trusting relationships and community for adults with IDD.

Mentorship Orientation

- 5 mentors and 10 mentees are selected
 - Mentors
 - An adult with a developmental disability who was actively navigating their own health care and community resources with little to no assistance. They need to have a coaching mindset.
 - Mentees
 - An adult with a developmental disability not yet navigating independently, but with potential to grow. Their caregiver needs to agree to support their independence development.
- Mentors and mentors complete mentoringcentral.net online training
- Mentors receive training on active listening and problem solving
- Both receive training on healthy boundaries and goal setting



Mentorship Program Overview

- Group meetings with mentors and mentees are once per month
- Group meetings consisted of a mentor presentation, community guest presenter, and breakout mentorship groups for goal setting
- 2 weeks after each meeting: mentor and mentees by phone to follow up on goals





Mentor Huddles

- 30 minutes before the group meeting, mentors meet to discuss successes and challenges with helping their mentors meet their goals



Horticultural Options in Plant Sciences (H.O.P.S.) Project

- The HOPS Project is a <u>two semester</u> (approximately 32 weeks) training program.
- The <u>purpose</u> of the program is to provide instruction and support to individuals with disabilities to <u>gain the</u> <u>necessary skills and experiences in work</u> <u>readiness</u> in order to successfully transition into competitive integrated employment <u>in the</u> <u>horticulture industry.</u>
