Keeping Kids Safe From Heatstroke in Hot Cars


What causes heatstroke?

Heatstroke happens when the body overheats or can't cool down. This can cause organ failure, brain damage, or even death.



Texas has more child deaths due to heatstroke in a car than any other state.

How do child heatstroke deaths in cars happen?*



- Caregiver Forgot Child in the Car
- Child Gained Access to a Vehicle Without Caregiver Knowing
- Caregiver Knowingly Left Child in the Car

Cars heat up quickly.

On a 90-degree day, the inside temperature of a car can increase:



Also, kids' bodies heat up 3 to 5 times faster than an adult's.

From parents to grandparents to siblings to friends -- forgetting a child in a car can happen to anyone

Any of these factors can contribute to forgetting a child in the back seat.*



Lack of sleep



Being stressed



Change in routine



Being distracted

How to Prevent Heatstroke in Hot Cars



Never leave a child alone in a car.

There is no excuse to leave a child in the car, such as a quick trip into the store, even if the car is running.



Keep cars locked at all times.

Always lock your car doors and trunks – even at home.

Keep car keys away from children.

If a child is missing, check pools and water sources first, then vehicles, including trunks.

Use reminders.



Keep a stuffed animal or other memento in your child's seat when it's empty. Move it to the front seat when your child is in the back as a visual reminder.

Use reminders to check the back seat when you reach your destination. Place something you will need in the back seat when traveling with a child.



Call 911 immediately.

If you see a child alone in a car, call 911 immediately.

You will be protected from civil liability for damages resulting when a child is rescued.
