National Nurses Appreciation Week May 6-12, 2022

Texas Education Agency (TEA): 2021-2022 Annual School Health Survey

The <u>TEA's 2021-2022 School Health Survey</u> is due May 27, 2022. Texas Education Code (TEC), §38.0141, requires school districts and open-enrollment charter schools to provide school health and physical activity information to TEA. School Health Survey data is used by the TEA and policymakers to address the health-related needs of Texas public schools and students.

Heat Awareness Week May 16-22, 2022

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) observes <u>Heat Awareness</u> <u>Week May 16-22, 2022</u>. This <u>CDC Heat and Infants and Children resource</u> shares information to keep infants and children safe as temperatures rise. It includes tips to prevent and identify heat related illness. Texas Oral Health Basic Screening Survey Begins Fall 2022-2023

Next school year, the Texas Department of State Health Services <u>Oral Health</u> <u>Improvement Program (OHIP)'s Smiles in Schools</u> will screen kindergarteners and third graders at select schools for a special report on the oral health of Texas children. This report is created every five years. Past reports show that nearly 53 percent of kindergarteners and 67 percent of third graders in Texas have experienced tooth decay. OHIP needs to screen children at all types of schools all over the state. Your school may be asked to participate in the special statewide oral health screening. National Garden Bureau: 2022 Therapeutic Garden Grant

The National Garden Bureau, American Meadows, Corona Tools, and Sakata Seed America fund the Therapeutic Garden annual grant. The National Garden Bureau funds programs that promote the health and healing powers of human interaction with plants. To qualify, applicants must have a defined therapeutic garden program with a qualified staff member/advisor. The program must be at least one year old at the time of application with at least a five-year commitment for the garden to remain on the property. Applications are due by July 1, 2022.
