2023-2024 Nita M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC), Cycle 12 Grant

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) is accepting applications for the 2023-2024 Nita M. Lowey 21st CCLC, Cycle 12, Year 1 grant. The federal Nita M. Lowey 21st CCLC program supports the creation and expansion of community learning centers that provide academic and enrichment opportunities during afterschool and summer programming particularly for students who attend high-poverty and low-performing schools. Independent school districts, open-enrollment charter schools, regional education service centers, community-based organizations, and Indian tribe or tribal organizations are eligible to apply. Oliver Foundation Healthy Choices Grants

The Oliver Foundation's goal is to encourage children, families, and communities in Texas to improve eating and physical activity patterns. The Oliver Foundation has several Healthy Choices grants available for schools ranging from \$750 to \$5,000. Physical activity and nutrition education components are required for the grants.
